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# 2018 FAIR DEDICATION

THE 99<sup>TH</sup> ANNUAL BULKLEY VALLEY FALL FAIR IS DEDICATED TO

### **JIM STOREY**

Jim was born and raised in the Bulkley Valley and was an early participant in the Bulkley Valley Fall Fair. He told of the fun they had racing their horses on the track at the location of the present Heritage Park. In fact, racing was an important part of the Fall Fair back in the day.

Jim moved away from the Valley to follow his job on the CN and later as an electrician for a pulp mill in Prince George but managed to attend the fair as often as possible. In the late 1960's, he moved his family to Evelyn and both he and his wife, Hazel, became involved in the Fall Fair and the Saddle Club.

Jim joined the Fair Board of Directors and served almost continually for the rest of his active life. He was very involved with the move to the present fair grounds and was most enthusiastic to find the room for a race track which had long been a dream of Jim's and the Northern Saddle Club.

Jim and Carl Glover designed the layout of the new fairground with input from various board members. As the facilities grew and more activities were added, it became apparent that a 24 hour presence was necessary to keep vandalism down. Jim moved his trailer and family to the grounds after receiving permission from both the fair board and the Town. By borrowing his dad's equipment, Jim added land-clearing and mowing to his list of self-proclaimed duties.

Jim was a charter member of the Northern Saddle Club and was an enthusiastic promoter of all things involving horses. In the 1980's the dream to build a race track came true through with the support of the Northern Saddle Club, the Fair Board, the Rodeo and many, many hours of donated individual time and labour and the donated machinery of local contractors. A new event was added to the yearly schedule which was called "The Good Times/Old Times Round-Up." Jim travelled the Province looking for starting gates; he even met with the head of the BC Racing Association about what had to be done to get racing going in Smithers. While there were quite a number of race enthusiasts, there were not enough trained race horses or riders to make pari-mutual racing possible. Some people entered the races that had never been on a track before with disastrous results. Jim, along with many others, was very disappointed, to say the least. After several years of having the "Pony Chuck" races instead, the dream of a race track was finished and now, most of the track has been dismantled.

Jim was always an advocate for the rodeo. He helped the Kinsmen design and construct the rodeo area of the fair grounds. This arena was used for the early light horse shows until the present Horse Show arena was developed. Several different groups had put on the rodeos over the years and usually at a different time than the Fair. Jim was involved in these events as well. After the Kinsmen gave up the rodeo, there never seemed to be a group that would last very long.

In 2002, the present rodeo club was formed with the express intention of making it a prominent and permanent part of the Fair. Jim was the guiding force behind this event along with many other enthusiastic volunteers. The Club approached the Fair and the rest is history. Mark Wagner (MF WAGNER Shows) donated \$2000 to get things started. SHOOTING STAR AMUSEMENTS continues to support the rodeo in the same manner today.

Jim was also instrumental in the Draft Horse Show and Pull. When his dad retired, Jim talked his siblings into helping him purchase a team of Belgians for his dad. Jim, Claude Dohler and Graeme Johnstone invited local teamsters to attend a demonstration Heavy Horse Show as part of the entertainment for Sunday afternoon. The first Draft Horse Shows were held in the livestock ring. Because of the number of interested exhibitors and fans, the horse show was moved to the Light Horse Ring for a brief period and then to the rodeo arena. The BC Championship Draft Horse Pull was launched. Again, MF WAGNER SHOWS came forward by presenting a show harness each year to the winner of the Pull. Later, that was changed to cash. Joe and Brenda Medeiros of SHOOTING STAR continue this tradition of supporting the Pull.

Jim loved to dance and a Fall Fair Dance on Saturday night of the Fair was a necessity. For several years, various other groups would host the dance at the Civic Centre arena but the music wasn't "country and western" enough to satisfy Jim. He brought the proposal to the Board to have a true Fall Fair Dance and run it ourselves. Later, the Smithers Rodeo Club took over the dance.

Jim was also instrumental in putting the roof on the original stage. He and Claude gathered local contractors and equipment and, over several weekends, the roof was on. The entire Board was out to help – the ladies fed the workers and Jim provided "refreshments."

He helped with the Parade floats in the early years. He even went so far as to the put "The Sundowners" in the back of his beloved pickup and allowed signs to be posted on it. Several times, he hooked his gelding, Pronto, to a buggy and joined the parade. He was always on hand to help his dad, Laurie Storey, get his draught team ready for the parade.

Jim served on the Management Committee which is made up of two members from the Town, two from the Fair Board and an independent Chairman. Jim and Claude Dohler were the first representatives from the Fair. Jim was joined by Graeme Johnstone when Claude stepped down. Jim had the audacity on several occasions to instruct and educate Town members on what the agreement said about the rights and duties of both organizations. It came to a head one weekend afternoon when many people showed up to the grounds intent on roller skating in the Quonset. The Management Committee had not given permission for this; the Fair hadn't been contacted or asked about it; and, most of all, the grounds attendant (Jim) hadn't been notified of the occasion. He barred the gate and wouldn't let anyone in. All users of the grounds were obligated to go through the Management Committee and Jim was going to be sure that was followed.

He was fiercely loyal to the Fair and all the different events that happened during the Fair. Even after he moved to Bulkley Lodge, either his family or a friend would bring him down to the Fair.



- If only one (1) entry in a class, no 1<sup>st</sup> place will be awarded unless the item is deemed of exceptional quality.
- 6. Judges decisions will be final.
- Basis for awarding most points (Divisions E, F, G, J, K, L & T): three points for first, two points for second and one point for third, where applicable. Director's decision will be final.
- 8. Exhibits for Divisions B, E, F, G, J, K, T1, T2, T3, T7, T9 (except quilts) and V will be accepted between 10 am and 4 pm, Wednesday, August 22<sup>nd</sup>. Exhibits will not be accepted after 4 pm.

- P. Exhibits for Divisions L (Arts, Photography) and Quilts T4, T5, T6, T9 (classes 10-11) will be accepted ONLY at the following times: August 17<sup>th</sup> between 5 pm and 9 pm and August 18<sup>th</sup> between 10 am and 2 pm. **Exhibitors' Guidelines:** Variety name should be stated on exhibitors tag. This adds to the educational value of the fair. All vegetables and fruits should be free from pests, blemishes and mechanical injuries. Entries should be clean but not scrubbed to the point of damaging the surface.

Potatoes and Onions should not be washed at all. Arrange on paper or plastic plate.

**Beets:** Trim tops to 1/2 inch, leave roots intact; free of scab, scaling and sunburn.

**Cabbages:** The stalk should be trimmed but one or two of the outer leaves left on. A round, firm head is preferred.

**Carrots:** Tops should be trimmed to about 1/2 inch, fine bottom root may be trimmed but not cut off completely, no side roots. The surface should be smooth.

**Kohlrabi:** Roots and leaf stems should be trimmed close to the bulb.

**Herbs:** Even colouring, the herbs should be tied in neat bunches with clearly printed labels firmly attached.

**Lettuce:** All types of lettuce should be clean, tender, of even colour. Roots and only damaged outside leaves should be removed.

**Onions:** Roots trimmed to 1/2 inch, and tops should be mature, dried and trimmed to 1/2 inch. Only the dirty outer scales should be removed. Do not wash. Round shape is preferred.

**Potatoes:** No greening or scabs, eyes few and shallow, skin set, indicative of maturity, solid even coloured flesh, no inside growth cracks. Do not wash.

**Rhubarb:** All stalks at least 10 inches long, firm, and crisp. Pull stalks, cutting away loose, flaky tissue only. Trim leaf to 1 inch fan shape.

**Squash:** Trim stem to 1/2 inch, colour and shape appropriate to type, mature but not oversized.

**Tomatoes:** Should be firm, thick fleshed, stems should be left on, no green shoulders on red tomatoes.

### **TERMINOLOGY:**

**Annual**: a plant that grows, blooms, seeds and dies in one year and is reproduced from seeds

**Arrangement**: a flower arrangement is the art of using the principles of design to control one or more units of plant material to obtain beauty and harmony

**Biennials**: a plant that grown the first year and blooms, seeds and dies the second year and is reproduced from seeds

**Bloom**: a single flower on a stem, foliage removed

Bouquet: cut flowers in a clear container

**Collection**: a group of cut flowers (not judged on arrangement) **Composition**: the art of using the principles of design, utilizing plant material with suitable accessories, to be displayed in one container

**Double & Semi-doubles**: flower has more than one layer of petals

Kind: shall be used to indicate plant characteristics which are similar and that belong to the same general category; e.g., asters and petunias are kinds of flowers

**Perennials**: a plant that lives for more than two years, growing from the same root, bulb or tuber each year, wintering either in or out of the ground

**Side shoots**: a lateral branch, with subsequent branching, but with the main stem excluded

**Single**: flower has a centre with one layer of petals **Spike**: a flower structure with flowers stemless on a common lengthened stalk. Used sometimes where stems of the individual flowers are very short; e.g., gladiolus, snapdragons




